INCLUSION At Its Best

Part of the Kreider Services' Mission makes reference to Inclusion into community events for the people we provide services to. Many of our homes have taken this idea to heart this summer and have really gotten involved in the communities they live in. The residents and staff are participating, volunteering and actively seen at events. It is good for people attending and running events to see us out there. Sure, they might need a little more assistance and coaching, but some of the events just go to show that Inclusion works!

Let's roll back the calendar and take a look at some of these activities that clients and staff have been involved in:

- Two homes and staff helped with the United Way Day of Caring in June and we had a team from DHS Key Club and the YWCA clean up the Kreider Park and flowerbeds.
- Petunia Festival Parade 35 clients and 20 employees and their families participated in the parade. About 25 employees helped one day at the festival pouring beverages.
- Drum Corps Show The Kreider Drumline and Color Guard



- performed at the Aug. 1st Petunia City Brass DCI show in Rock Falls.
- Petunia City Stix was scheduled to play with the Dixon City Band but got rained out in July.
- In August, we did a collection for "Tools for Schools" and delivered a car load of school supplies to Dixon Public Schools.
- Florissa was involved at Quartermania at the Dixon Elks Lodge.
- Galena homes were part of the Galena Culver's Give Back Night where over \$600 was donated to Kreider Services.
- We had an entry at the Fiesta Parade in Rock Falls and Sterling.
- Volunteers from Jo Daviess handed out water at the Galena Triathlon to partici-

- pants at the Fever River Adventure. A portion of those event proceeds will be donated back to Kreider.
- The Kiwanis Aktion Club helped sell peanuts during the annual Peanut Days.
- JJ Slaton is often seen helping at events with the Com Ed Efficiency Education Program.
- Mike Danekas is active with the Amboy Lions Club.
- The Executive Team, staff and the Kiwanis Aktion Club members helped package 15,000 meals for the United Way Kickoff at SVCC.
- Hilltop staff and residents helped the kids paint pumpkins at the Dixon Scarecrow Festival and HR had a booth at the event.

Two of the main topics were funding money-follows-theperson which allows people to get the supports they need when they need them. It makes moving between levels of care more seamless. We also thanked our representatives and senators for delaying the start of Electronic Event Verification, or EEV. Eventually, all places like Kreider Services will be required to log all events that are billed to Medicaid. Currently, we are not ready to provide this kind of detail on daily activities. A year will give us a little breathing room and allow us to get it right.

As we move from Fall to Winter, you might notice we have a new plow truck. We made it through last winter but paid a lot of outside contractors to move snow. We got a good deal on it and purchased it locally from Ken Nelson. This new vehicle will help us make sure driveways and parking lots are safe after snowfall. Fingers crossed, maybe a new snowplow will keep the snow away!

Stucco Project Finished

The stucco project that was started in 2017 was finished this Summer to the main Kreider building on Anchor Road. The bricks were deteriorating and this has been a reasonable repair that will maintain the exterior of the building for many years to come.



COMCAST Media Lab

Work has started on the new Comcast Media Lab at the KSI building at 500 Anchor Road in Dixon. The Comcast Foundation made a \$10,000 donation last December to us to build the area. Although the details are still being hashed out, the vision is to have individual work stations complete with ADA computers and keyboards, IPads, Internet and other technology that clients will learn how to use.

We feel it is important to teach folks in Day Services and the community clients the "how's" on usage which will also include safety tips for use to protect personal information when using social media. The Lab will also be an area that people can use to build skills needed if they wish to seek employment in the community. So, stay tuned for a projected Spring completion. KSI staff and volunteers from the outside will be used to run classes. If you wish to support this project, we know the cost is going to exceed the \$10,000 gift from Comcast.

New Willow Home Complete

Kreider Services held an Open House in August for the neighborhood, guardians and contractors that worked on the new autism home. The old Willow, one of our 28 residential programs, was purchased by Bonnell Industries about 2 years ago. Kreider Alliance purchased 5 acres of land behind the main KSI building and construction began. This was a very unique project and is State of the Art. The design of the home both inside and out, equipment and artwork was carefully selected for people with autism. It was important to create an area so residents could move freely about the halls.

Much of the construction was done by the KSI Maintenance Department. This project was used to teach several of the higher functioning people in Day Services basic carpentry skills as they worked side by side with them.



The staff working in the home shown above were very involved in helping the residents select colors for their rooms and designing the special sensory room. The art in the hallway is interactive. The patio in the rear of the home allows residents to go outside to enjoy some fresh air.

Kreider Alliance is the parent organization of Kreider Services. Their mission is to provide advocacy, education and support to people with disabilities in Kreider programs and the community.




Looking For Volunteers

Dixon Delegates





The Dixon Delegates is a new client group that was started last Spring. Lisa Olson, Activity Coordinator is the staff that coordinates these efforts in conjunction with the Illinois Self-Advocacy Alliance Network. This group received a 3-year grant from the State of Illinois to work with people with developmental disabilities. This Alliance group utilizes people with all types of disabilities as mentors. The purpose of the grant is to involve people and teach them how to become self advocates with the goal of trying to make change in Illinois.

There are 12 clients involved in the new Dixon Delegates group that meet one time monthly. Meetings are open to anyone wanting to attend and they are looking to increase the size of the group. The Mission of the Dixon Delegates is: To help people learn what they want and to live that life. The Vision is: To Show America what it is about. "My Life... My Choice".

A few things the group is starting discussion on is funding and employment. Another issue brought up is that some of our older folks want to retire. Lisa is working on making a video on "What Independence Means to Me." Stan Bown, group Chairman, recently attended a workshop held by the state organization to learn communication skills, teamwork and parliamentary steps as he takes a leadership role in this group. Another member, Steve Pontnack, will begin an eight month training

program as part of the Partners in Policy-Making Program teaching him how to work with politicians. Steve was chosen for this from over 100 applicants.

Meetings are held the 3rd Monday of every month from 3 – 4:30 pm at Kreider Services.

Lisa said the group hopes to create their own Facebook page, learning how to market themselves, doing mailings and presentations to area civic groups. Based on the costs of above activities, Dixon Delegates might be doing local fundraisers; i.e. cookout at Oliver's to cover some of these costs. Lisa will be able to submit some of the costs for promotion and training to the Illinois Advocacy Alliance for reimbursement.



Holiday Appeal

Thanksgiving week, every year, is when Kreider Services sends out the Annual Holiday Appeal to guardians, friends and local businesses.

This campaign is very valuable to the programs at Kreider as it raises funds to help supplement other funding we get throughout the year.

The campaign runs from Thanksgiving through the end of February. As in past years, donors are given the opportunity to either give to an unrestricted fund or to a restricted fund specific to a designated program area. This allows every donation to be the choice of those giving.

The Annual Holiday Appeal last year had a 1-1 match of funds donated from an anonymous donor. Before this match, we raised \$40,000 from individual donations. Our goal for this year is to surpass last year.

Annual Report

The Kreider Services fiscal year comes to an end every year on June 30th. The next few months are spent designing the Annual Report and obtaining financial reports following our audit and gathering human interest stories.

This year's Annual Report will be available in a few weeks. The focus this year is taking one client, Maria Liebermann who came to Kreider a little over a year ago and telling her story, while showing images of interaction with her peers and the support of the Kreider staff. This approach is to highlight the many programs offered at Kreider.

This is her story of success and how the programs and staff at Kreider Services have helped her get to where she is today. No more wheelchair, she lives in a group home, works 5 days a week in the production area, participates in Flag Team and the Kiwanis Aktion Club. She has great social skills, drive and the story goes on.

It's Much More Than A Game

Kreider Services cut out many of the Special Olympics programs several years ago due to the cost of staff and participation. But this is not to say the clients aren't playing sports.

Under the direction of Lisa Olson, Activity Coordinator and other KSI staff members, we have been very active this Summer with bocce ball, softball, bowling, golf and flag football. We have two people advancing to Bowling Regionals in early November.

The practices are held after 3 pm when Day Services is done for the day so it does not cut into work hours. Kreider is fortunate that we have great practice fields in the park behind the building, with the addition of James Court last year which allows us space for many of these sporting activities. The Meaningful Day funds that began over four years ago have helped fund many of the sports mentioned.

Kreider does have several sports activities that are part of the Special Olympics roster. Kreider has 10 people that played golf weekly. They competed in the Golf Skills Challenge where this



year Mike D. got a hole in one. The KSI Golf Team also had a four-some in the Kreider Open this Summer at Shady Oaks in Amboy.



Basketball practice began a few weeks ago. As in the past, Kreider has two teams that compete. We try to schedule several games throughout the Winter to give the teams a chance to play others which

helps the team prepare for regional competition. Kreider also has about 10 athletes that compete in Winter sports which include snow shoeing and downhill skiing.

Earlier this month, we had about 90 clients that participated in the Annual MATP Games. These are unique because they are a series of activities that are designed for people who are



unable to play other sports due to their disabilities. Each participant received a medal that was handed out by Lee Co. Sheriff John Simonton who volunteered

to help with the games. Special Olympics is celebrating their 50th Anniversary this year. Each athlete



wore their medals with pride.

Our annual wheelchair football game was rescheduled that same day due to the unusually cold day in October.



Kreider needs volunteers to help coach and can use sporting equipment to off-set costs. Examples of equipment needed are jr. size footballs and regular basketballs.
